ABOUT THE COLLEGE

The Tamil Evangelical Lutheran Church (T.E.L.C) was born in 1919 to serve the cause of the poor, downtrodden and the marginalized sections of the Tamil Society. Realising the need for the establishment of a centre for higher education the T.E.L.C. chose Porayar, a rural hamlet in the erstwhile Thanjavur District for starting its first higher education institution. The vision was brought into reality with the rise of Tranquebar Bishop Manikam Lutheran College which was named after Late Rt. Rev. Dr.R. B. Manikam, the first Indian Bishop of the Church. It became an important land mark in the annals of the T.E.L.C on 19th June 1972. The Government of Tamil Nadu approved the establishment of the college vide its Government Order No. 1888, Education Department dated College 29.11.1972. The now offers Undergraduate, 12 Postgraduate Courses and 8 Research Programme leading to Ph.D.

Nakkiran and Dr. Frank Ratnakumar, the T.B.M.L College, Porayar is identified in the Map of India. ABOUT THE WORKSHOP

It focuses on various aspects like, upgrading cooperative institutions with digital tools, ensuring transparency and accountability through regular audits, providing financial support and training to cooperatives in both rural and urban areas, promoting healthy competition between cooperatives and private businesses, and supporting the creation of new cooperatives in sectors like agriculture, dairy, fisheries, and housing. With these steps, the policy aims to make cooperatives a strong pillar of rural development and an important part of India's economy.

The policy rests on six pillars – strengthening foundations, promoting vibrancy, preparing cooperatives for future challenges, enhancing inclusivity, expanding reach, and engaging youth in cooperative development. These pillars aim to create self-reliant and sustainable cooperative institutions across India.

To ensure effective implementation, the policy provides for dedicated monitoring through a National Steering Committee and a Policy Implementation & Monitoring Committee, supported by an Implementation Cell in the Ministry of Cooperation.

The New Cooperative Policy thus envisions cooperatives as engines of inclusive growth, sustainability, and rural transformation, enabling collective prosperity for millions of members while strengthening India's economic resilience.
